

## **“The Hope of the Resurrection”**

This past February, my family and I were able to see the musical “The Color Purple” at the Park Square Theater in St. Paul. I have been listening to this musical for over three years. I love the music and the message within it (some of you already know this because I do talk about it quite frequently. I know. I know. I’m sorry). But its story is Gospel. It is the good news of God revealed in someone’s life. One of the things I love about the music and play is that it wrestles with some big theological ideas. What is the purpose of this life? Is it okay to suffer now because one day we will be with God in heaven? Who is a saint? Who is a sinner? And is it ever too late for redemption?

When I was a child, I was pretty convinced that religion had everything to do with what happened after I died. My belief that Jesus was Lord and had died for my sins meant that I would live forever in heaven. But beyond that I couldn’t tell you much about how my faith should influence my daily life. I think very differently today. I spend a lot of time thinking about how faith matters in my life today and what role faith should play in the ways in which we act in the world. This is part of what is uncovered in “The Color Purple.” Celie (the main character) is in an abusive, horrible relationship and she is resigned to the fact that her life on earth will just be this way. She says: “This life will soon be over, but heaven lasts always.” In time her understanding of God leads her to believe that God has forgotten about her. She is filled with anger toward God. It takes her good friend to help her see that God isn’t for some day (heaven), but today and that when we look around the world we can see God’s presence in our lives. We can also hear the answer to our prayers to God by taking a stand and saying no to the injustices in our lives. Celie is finally able to do this on Easter Sunday of all days. She stands before her abusive husband and declares that she is going to leave him and that every mean and hateful thing he has said to her doesn’t matter because she is here and she matters. When we saw this scene performed live, the entire audience erupted in applause. I love live theater. Together we celebrated the magnitude of this moment. Celie is a new creation.

A few weeks ago I preached asking the question, “What do we stand for as a Christian community?” and I pondered if we too could respond as Paul does in the end of the book of Acts that we stand for the Hope of the Resurrection. In some ways this idea of the hope of the resurrection seems opaque. What does that even mean. Is this the hope that one day we will be in heaven as I believed as a child, or as Celie thought as well? Or does it mean something more? Paul testified to this truth time and time again when he was put

on trial for his faith. Paul completely believed in the resurrection of the dead, but I believe he also believed that the hope of the resurrection had something to say about this life as well. It has something to say about the ways we act in the world on regular basis and how to work alongside of people who are different from us. The bible study we have been using states that Paul responds to the Jewish and Roman authorities by using the "politics of the resurrection." We are so used to politics being something that divides us. We are republican or democrat. We believe in big or little government and our list could go on and on. But the politics of the resurrection or hope in the resurrection is very different than the politics we see on display in our world regularly. Instead it shows us a different way to be, a different way to challenge the powers that be in our world not by using oppression and force, but by living in hope, by cooperating, by trusting that God is present when all voices are heard.

The hope of the resurrection celebrates that all people from all nations are around the throne of God and have a place there and sometimes these voices disagree with one another, but one voice, one person is not better or worse than the next. And when we believe in that hope we work to restore life, to build up, and to empower people to be the person God has created them to be. Believing in the hope of the resurrection isn't simple. It means we have to be willing to listen to people we disagree with and to believe that there perspectives have value. At times it means that we have to stand up against oppressive powers because they have silenced us or others too long.

My favorite song, in "The Color Purple" comes at the end of the musical when Celie looks back over her life and gives thanks. She gives thanks for her sister, children, house and more. She states: "I'm thankful for every day that I'm given, both the easy and hard ones I'm living, but most of all I am thankful for loving who I really am. I'm beautiful. Yes, I'm beautiful and I'm here." For me this is it. The hope of the resurrection. Celie stands and sings as God's new creation, empowered, emboldened and filled with love for the world and for herself. It is this love that gives her the capacity to forgive her husband and to listen to everyone God has created with love, respect and empower them to live as well.

## BEING SAVED

There are some words and phrases that the church uses that for some people feel really “churchy” or “religious” in a bad way. “Being saved” is one of these phrases that has been given a good deal of airtime in our culture. For some churches, “being saved” has to do with a personal act of acceptance of Jesus Christ as savior and Lord. This sense of “being saved” is not Lutheran. In fact, any reliance on our own

ability to choose God is viewed as very suspicious by most Lutherans. Instead we trust and believe that God is always coming to us. In fact, Luther recognized that God is simply out of our reach as small, limited, finite creatures. There is no way, journey, path or decision that can get you to God, from a Lutheran point of view.

The good news, however, that Luther saw in the Biblical story, is that despite human frailty, foibles, flaws and limitations, God is always seeking us out, coming after us, chasing us down, intercepting us, and finding us. Often in places we’d least expect. God is always in direct communication with us. This is great news, if like me, you realize that almost every attempt at being good, or being godly, or being faithful, fails miserably. Usually, the moment I’m feeling faithful and good, I feel the angels of my lesser nature creep up and inspire me to do something stupid, or hurtful or angry. Or, even in my best moments of decision or action there is almost always some unintended outcome that may or may not be positive.

For us as Lutherans, “being saved” is not a choice we make, but a choice God makes in choosing us. We in fact admit that too often our best laid plans oft times go awry. We say, “we are in bondage to sin and cannot free ourselves.” We are stuck in our own humanity. We are stuck in our own brains, and can’t see the whole picture of life and world, we are stuck in our limited bodies, stuck in our limitations of life, stuck in our path toward death.

This being the case, the “being saved” part for Lutherans goes something more like we are saved from having to wear a mask. Saved from having to be or act like someone the world around me would like me to be. Saved from the burden of having to have it all together. Saved from having to pretend we are perfect or good, or godly, or faithful, or wonderful or anything else for that matter. We are saved from having to be perfect. Saved from having to use all that energy to act or speak in the “right” way. We are free to admit that we say and do dumb things, and then move on from them without dwelling on them or beating ourselves up about them.

We are saved to speak freely and act with boldness, with the hope that God will redeem both all my words and actions. And we are free to view others in the same way. We are free to put the best possible construction on our neighbor’s actions and speech because God is doing the same for

our neighbor and us too! And we are saved to speak freely with love and kindness because love and kindness has been given to us, without merit, without our needing to choose it. In fact if someone asked Luther today, “Are you saved?” he would simply respond, “Why, Yes! I have been baptized.” In other words, God came to him, loved him, spoke to him, and choose him! Just as God comes to you, loves you, speaks to you, and chooses you, even if you don’t choose God! This is the gift of “being saved” as a Lutheran! You are baptized! Thanks be to God!

## LESSONS FROM A 2-YEAR OLD

My oldest son turns two this month. Wow! I was warned that time seems to go by faster when you have kids, and it's

definitely true. While my husband and I have spent every day of the last couple years teaching him how to eat, talk, walk, play and NOT hit, he's taught me more than I could've imagined. Here are some lessons I've learned from my two-year old:

**Dance.** Any kind of music – even a TV commercial jingle – triggers a dance party he just can't control! And why should he? Dance, rejoice, let the spirit take control and experience joy in a way that lets the world know you're happy!

**Learn with wonder.** My son is constantly observing, experiencing and learning, and it's all done with genuine curiosity and a sense of awe. As an adult, learning can be a critical exercise, constantly questioning if the processes and principles are "good" or "bad," "true" or "false," or "could be better or more efficient." While there's a time and place for that, it's much more peaceful to simply take it all in with an open mind and see how the new information might transform you. It's much more fun, pleasant and fulfilling to view the world with wonder.

**Don't dwell.** Whether it's a lost toy, a bump on the head or being told "no," he doesn't dwell on unpleasantness for long. He gives just as much time and attention as is necessary to get over it and then gets back to living his life.

**Listen and acknowledge.** Crazy cacophony happens when my son gets in a cycle of repeating himself over and over, louder and louder... and louder! I quickly realized this will spin out of control until I take the time to listen and acknowledge what he's saying. Even if my response is a no ("I hear that you want juice, but we aren't drinking juice right now."), he generally accepts it and moves on. More than the juice or cookie or whatever, he just wants to be heard.

**Laugh.** He loves to laugh! Tickles, silly songs, animals, water fountains, playgrounds and basically anything new he encounters all make him squeal with delight. Appreciate the simple things and let the joy they bring you make you laugh out loud!

**Love freely and often.** My son will give hugs, kisses and "love you's" to just about any person or stuffed animal he meets. When we're leaving family or friends after a visit, he will blow kisses and say he loves you about 25 times, and it never gets old. Take the time and show the love every chance you get. With all the hurt, fear and pain in the world, it will never be too much.

## LOOKING FOR ALTARS?

without further thought. The book, "An Altar in the World" by Barbara Brown Taylor, opens by talking about seeing altars in our world. It reminds me of looking for God in my day, or "God-sightings."
