

“CHASING RAINBOWS”

Driving home the other night, after a particularly difficult day, with some particularly difficult things still ahead... the isolated late afternoon thunderstorm that had developed blew past my traveling. The sunshine tore open the darkness and revealed the heavens of blue. In the midst of it, a broken, but double rainbow appeared on the backside of the dazzling white storm cloud as it passed into the western sky.

Earlier that day another pastor had reminded us all that the rainbow in the sky was not a child's reminder that God loves them, although there is nothing wrong with that thought. In the actual Biblical story the rainbow is to remind God that God has promised not flood the world again. The question is, “Why does God need to remind God's self of this?” That thought gives me a little twinge of fear... God needs a sky post-it-note to self that says, “remember, don't do that again...” Does God have a faulty memory?!

I don't know exactly what it means that God needs to remind God's self and it is sort of a terrifying thought that God might forget... But I know I need to remind myself, “people are for loving, not for hurting” as my mother would say after I punched my little brother in stomach, again. I know that I need reminders to forgive, to live in humility, to live with compassion, to act with kindness. And at this point of the passing storm, I sort of figure if God needs a reminder, well, how much more do I? If God even admits that God needs a physical expression of God's love and compassion and forgiveness and understanding... maybe it's okay for me to express my weakness and vulnerability to needing help, care, grace, and kindness too. Maybe it's okay that I need a physical reminder to act and live as God (and my mother) has hoped for me.

I saw the rainbow in this light as I drove home. God needed or wanted a reminder, and so do I... In fact, I see communion in this way every Sunday, physical reminders in bread and wine that God wins by loving and even losing... death on a cross. Bread and wine, physical reminders that being vulnerable, and weak is actually God and humanity's greatest strength. If God needs to rely on God's own reminder post-it-note in the sky, then maybe it's best if I too rely on God's promise of love, rather than my own wisdom, strength or understanding.

As I drove out of the thunder, but into trouble, the light of the rainbow lit my path. I took a deep breath and tried to envision breathing in God's Holy Spirit, a calm in the eye of the



BRING OUT THE STEEL

As iron sharpens iron, so one person sharpens another. – Proverbs 27:17

Have you ever tried to use a knife or ax that wasn't sharp? It can be dangerous. One false move and we might be calling you "Lefty" for the rest of your life. When I worked in restaurants, the cooks would often need help with prep work before the day began; especially if they were behind and so they would ask anyone to help with different tasks. The first thing they made sure of was that the knife they gave me would be sharp. Taking out a honing steel, they would work the knife to restore the edge, to make it better. As a future pastor I have found nothing but love and care from you as my church family these past eleven months. You have been my honing steel. You have done so well to keep track of my progress, to bring criticism when necessary, to offer encouragement and empowerment as I learn and grow. I can only pray that my first congregation whom I will have the honor of serving is just as mindful and purposeful in their care of me as you have been during my tenure.

I will also say, though, that the sharpening, the honing, does not end with me. It is there for the benefit of each of you too. Caring for one another. Keeping track of the suffering of others to help transform and strengthen each other. It may seem like a big job to do, but each of us impacts the other every day, even without knowing it. By waking up in the morning, going to the coffee shop, or the café, or to bible study, and smiling and saying "Hello," you become a small piece of iron that sharpens another person. Making them feel important, loved, and necessary.

Within the church this becomes part of the disciple-making process. Of guiding and forming people in faith. Eventually, through the work of the Spirit in all our lives, we can begin to see the discipleship of one another not as a duty, but as a joy. As a time of bonding and gathering one another together. Over the next year, Pastors Joanna and Scott have so many wonderful ideas planned of how to encourage this process and growth through fellowship and learning. I am excited to see all the things God is working through Shepherd of the Hills as the days move ahead, and I am sad that I won't be around to see it, but I know I will hear about it.

Meanwhile, as my period here comes closer to ending, I can honestly declare to you that my time with you has been nothing short of amazing. Freedom has taken on a new place of wonder and meaning for me this year.

I have wondered if someone who has never experienced a limitation in their freedom can really appreciate the glory of it?

My dad is a Korean war veteran. I always feel he is more acutely aware of the price of freedom and witnessed places where freedom was not part of life. He always says that he hopes he paid the price for all generations for his family's freedom so no one he loves has to serve. If it were not for his experience (and those service men and women I read about), I would take freedom even more for granted than I already do. What is it like to live in a place where you do not have freedom? It seems there is more fear, anxiety, less drive to succeed because of the limitations placed by the lack of freedom—or there is a huge drive to rebel against the establishment that limits one's freedom. There is a lack of inner peace that oozes out.

Martin Luther wrote a famous paper called "The Freedom of a Christian." My simple synopsis would be that Luther points out the depth of the freedom we have in God's gracious, merciful forgiveness and the ability to start each day new (we just need to get out of God's way and let that happen!) In this most complete and extreme freedom, we as Christians might be the free-est of all peoples! My favorite quote from this paper is: "A Christian is a perfectly free lord of all, subject to none. A Christian is a perfectly dutiful servant of all, subject to all."

In 1 Corinthians 9:19 Paul says, "Though I am free and belong to no one, I have made myself a slave to everyone..."

This freedom I experience, when I allow myself to be forgiven, makes my soul feel light again and like I could soar, and in turn to serve others because of what has been done for me (us). This is the closest I can get to grasping the amazing freedom I have as an American. Yes, like my sin, this freedom came at a huge price. Once again, faith intersects with everyday life, God breaks into my everyday experience and I am amazed.

In the beauty of summer, as we enjoy less schedule and more freedom, take a minute to savor freedom. Take time to wonder about those who do not experience freedom. Pray for them. Pray for peaceful reconciliations. Ask God to enter in bringing forgiveness, peace and that ultimate freedom only God through Jesus can provide.
